
#Give828 Recap

Yesterday, August 28th, Redress joined #Give828, a national day of giving focused specifically on supporting Black-led and Black-benefitting organizations. #Give828 isn't like other fundraising campaigns. #Give828 takes place during Black Philanthropy Month, and the date commemorates multiple critical historical landmarks in Black Americans' march toward freedom.

Thanks to you, members of our movement, we crossed our goal by mid-day, and we finished the day at more than double what we hoped to achieve. To say we are thankful is an understatement.

We're grateful for neighbors like you who are committed to leading a multi-racial movement that empowers communities to take direct action to redress racial segregation.

Together, we will continue to build on our work so we can all live in a world where race no longer determines where we live or the quality of our lives, and where all neighborhoods are thriving and inclusive.



Redress On The Move!



This week, Redress Executive Director Cashauna Hill joined "Love Thy Neighbor: Envisioning a Housing Ecosystem That Serves All," a panel at PolicyLink's Equity Summit 2024, about redesigning a housing system that works for all.

Creating this new system requires that we intentionally repair past harms, redefine our concepts of belonging and neighborliness to center the dignity of the 100 million people experiencing poverty, and reimagine the role of the public and private sectors in our housing system. Participants left with an enriched understanding of the importance of neighborliness and its impact on collective well-being, as well as housing's crucial role in our shared futures. By exploring how to embed housing rights and access into policy priorities at all levels of government, the workshop fostered critical discussions on shaping the future of housing justice.

Additionally, just today, Cashauna published an op-ed in Next City connecting the mass incarceration crisis to the housing affordability crisis. Here's an excerpt from the piece:

"Mass incarceration and homelessness are not isolated phenomena. They are deeply intertwined issues that reflect broader societal failures. Dismantling this vicious cycle requires a commitment to compassionate, evidence-based policies that address their root causes."
